► INTRODUCTION

- ► lays out the central questions of the research project.
- provides a global overview of your argument ("I argue" . . ./"This paper describes . . .")
- > end of the introduction offers a roadmap for the rest of the paper
- ► LITERATURE REVIEW
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► INTRODUCTION

► LITERATURE REVIEW

- ► offers a description of what scholars have done before.
- ➤ it does not necessarily summarize the literature; however, it attempts to tie the relevant literature to your question.
 - ► Fill in a gap either theoretical, methodological, or empirical.
 - Synthesis/bridging (bringing together two bodies of research that have not talked to each other)
 - ► In the tradition of X.
 - > Replicating an earlier study in a different way or in a different context.

► METHODS/SETTING

- ► EVIDENCE/DESCRIPTION OF THE DATA

 - ► A description of your data:
 - ► what you collected:
 - ► how you went about collecting the data.
 - ► how the data provides the best means of answering your question.
