- INTRODUCTION
> LITERATURE REVIEW
> METHODS/SETTING
> EVIDENCE/DESCRIPTION OF THE DATA
- CONCLUSION/DISCUSSION


## PARTS OF THE PAPER

- INTRODUCTION
$>$ lays out the central questions of the research project.
> provides a global overview of your argument ("I argue" . . ./"This paper describes . . .")
> end of the introduction offers a roadmap for the rest of the paper
> LITERATURE REVIEW
> METHODS/SETTING
- EVIDENCE/DESCRIPTION OF THE DATA
- CONCLUSION/DISCUSSION


## PARTS OF THE PAPER

- INTRODUCTION
> LITERATURE REVIEW
> offers a description of what scholars have done before.
> it does not necessarily summarize the literature; however, it attempts to tie the relevant literature to your question.
> Fill in a gap - either theoretical, methodological, or empirical.
> Synthesis/bridging (bringing together two bodies of research that have not talked to each other)
> In the tradition of X.
> Replicating an earlier study in a different way or in a different context.
> METHODS/SETTING
- EVIDENCE/DESCRIPTION OF THE DATA
> CONCLUSION/DISCUSSION


## PARTS OF THE PAPER

## > INTRODUCTION

> LITERATURE REVIEW
> METHODS/SETTING

- A description of your data:
> what you collected:
> how you went about collecting the data.
> how the data provides the best means of answering your question.


## > EVIDENCE/DESCRIPTION OF THE DATA

> CONCLUSION/DISCUSSION

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- INTRODUCTION
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> EVIDENCE/DESCRIPTION OF THE DATA
> Describing the evidence in an organized way.
- Provide examples, quotes, descriptive passages, etc.


## - CONCLUSION/DISCUSSION

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- CONCLUSION/DISCUSSION
- So what? Why does this research matter?
> What questions linger?
> What should scholars study in the future?
