► Sociology Department at University of Chicago

 \blacktriangleright Goal: to legitimize Sociology as an academic discipline

 Developed a human ecology to understand the relationship between communities, the natural environment, and human behavior.

➤ Favored of a biologically based conception of urban life.





- Drawing from Darwin ("web of life"), Park emphasized the relationship between various parts of the urban environment.
 - ► Competition arises from the most desirable land.
 - The biotic level (invasion competition)
 - ► The cultural level (succession)
 - ► Natural Areas of the City



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"Personal tastes and convenience, vocational and economic interests, infallibly tend to segregate and thus to classify the populations of great cities. In this way, the city acquires an organization which is neither designed nor controlled" (Park 1915: 579).



"The process of segregation establish moral distances which make the city a mosaic of little worlds which touch but do not interpenetrate. This makes it possible for individuals to pass quickly and

"THE GROWTH OF A CITY: AN INTRODUCTION TO A RESEARCH PROJECT" (1925)

- ➤ The purposes for land use follows a regular pattern, based not only on the price of land, but also the expense of commuting to the center from different distances.
 - inspired not only by the Human Ecology paradigm, but also neoclassic economic principles.
 - competition within the land market should result in each group getting the best location it can afford.
